New direct India link welcomed

Australia's first ever Dreamliner passenger flight has touched down at Sydney Airport, introducing Air India direct services between Delhi and Sydney.

"Sydney Airport is pleased to welcome Air India back to Sydney after a 22-year absence," Sydney Airport CEO Kerrie Mather said at a welcome event. "India is Australia's largest unserved market. Around 140,000 passengers travelled between Delhi and Sydney via Asian hubs last year."

Air India's daily direct service uses a 256-seat Boeing 787-800 Dreamliner with lie-flat business-class seats and large
